Note From the Playwright

Hello and welcome to Steel City Shakespeare's staged reading of *Dracula*! First and foremost, I want to thank you for taking the time to come see my production and offering your support. This project has been a labor of love and a ginormous challenge that has taught me a lot! The story and character of Dracula is very near and dear to my heart, and to bring Bram Stoker's work to life in my own vision is a dream come true.

To be honest with you, I can't really explain why, let alone put into words, why exactly I'm so obsessed with the story and character of Dracula. I really can't! All I know is that he's sort of been present in my life since I discovered him as a kid. I just found him fascinating and frightening, often times it was the latter more so than the former when it came to how I felt about him. But as I grew older, I dug deeper into this character and his story, and soon found myself obsessed with him! He quickly became my dream role, and I was fortunate enough to have a Drama teacher, Melissa Geer, recognize this and direct a production of Dracula my senior year of high school. A production that used a stage adaptation written by Steven Dietz.

Steven Dietz, in my opinion, wrote the best stage adaptation of Stoker's novel that I've ever read! Seriously, go read it when you get the chance, you can order it online. He found a way to streamline the various points of view in the novel and make it flow effortlessly on the stage while remaining incredibly faithful to Stoker's work. It's beautiful! In 2019, Dietz revisited his work and revamped (pun intended) his play and made Mina the main character of his revised work. In an interview, when asked about this particular approach, Dietz said, "We inherit these stories. We inherit Jane Austen, we inherit *Frankenstein*, we inherit *Dracula*, we inherit these stories. But we can only view them through our one slice of time. We will never view this story in any other time but our own. And therefore, I think our own time has to color our adaptations." Pretty great quote, isn't it? Once again, the brilliance of Steven Dietz inspired me and gave me a North Star, as it were, to follow when embarking on my own adaptation. Originally, I wanted to make the most faithful stage adaptation of Stoker's novel that anyone had ever seen! Obviously, this proved to be nearly impossible, and my first draft clocked in at a whopping 165 pages! Not even I, a huge fan of the story and being the playwright, would want to sit through a 3 hour+ play of Dracula, let alone perform in it! And that's where Dietz's quote came into play. Another goal I had for this adaptation was, "How can I make this different? How can I make this my own?" And Dietz really inspired me to step outside of my comfort zone and write from a perspective I wasn't familiar with, and to see how the issues and themes of Stoker's time lined up with the issues and themes of our time today.

Mina became the main character of my adaptation as I found her to be more relatable to the audience and could be the through line in most every scene of the play. I enjoy seeing Classic stories be reinvented and seen in a different light, and while I did a similar approach to my play as Dietz, I wanted to use Mina's journey in this story as a way to understand the fears and issues Women face today, and add a layer of a very real world Horror on top of the Supernatural one that Stoker wrote. I was asked once why tell the story of Dracula now, and my response to that is: it is more important now than ever to tell a story of a monster who uses his powers to control, manipulate, and abuse others for years, centuries even, and continues this pattern over and over and over again until one day a woman stands up to him and says, "Enough!"

Dietz was right, we do color these adaptations with our time, and I realized just how similar these time frames were with each other. Whether it is the Past, Present, or Future, we cannot ignore issues such as Abuse, Women's Rights, Toxic Masculinity, and Disease, or the themes of Tradition vs Progress, or the effects of a Patriarchal society, no matter where these things may pop up, or even when they do. While my goal tonight is not to preach to you on how to solve these issues, or how to even approach them, it is to remind you that no matter where we may come from, whether it's a different walk of life, faith, belief, country, or even period of time, we are all human. And we all face the same issues of pain and injustice that affect us all, so much so that we express these issues in our work and art, which speaks to others in a way nothing else can. Thus why stories like Dracula are as poignant and resonant today in 2022 as it was in 1897. Their pursuit in accurately portraying humanity is what makes these classic stories timeless.

I don't quite know what the future for my adaptation will hold. It may very well have a strong and fruitful afterlife that sees great success and longevity, just like Dietz's work. Or, this may be the one and only performance of this play. I don't know. I certainly hope for the former outcome rather than the latter. But what I can tell you now, with certainty, is that what I hope to achieve with this play, is that it makes you think, it makes you feel, and it reminds you just why we love and cherish these stories. We love being Human, and to be Human in an often inhumane world, is a gift that empowers the people and frightens the monsters. And Stoker captured the essence of this truth beautifully.

Without further ado, I invite you to sit back, relax, and enjoy the thrills and chills of one of the greatest horror stories of all time, and appreciate the level of humanity found in such a supernatural tale. Enjoy! And...




Post-Show Q&A with Shanna Stoker FRIDAY, OCTOBER 28



Abraham "Bram" Stoker was born in Dublin, Ireland, on November 8, 1847, the third of seven children to Abraham Stoker and Charlotte Mathilda Blake Thornley. He spent much of his childhood bedridden with illness, devoting himself to academic pursuits. As his childhood ailments dissipated, he enrolled in Trinity College in Dublin, earning both a BA and MA. He excelled in athletics and academics, being named University Athlete as well as auditor of the College Historical Society and president of the University Philosophical Society.

After college, he followed his father into the civil service profession but quickly fell in love with the theater, becoming a critic for the *Dublin Evening Mail*. In 1876, his glowing review of Henry Irving's performance as Hamlet at Dublin's Theatre Royal caught Irving's attention and established a decades-long partnership. Soon after, Stoker moved to London and served as business manager at the Lyceum Theatre, which Irving owned, for 27 years. His success in this post allowed him to form friendships with many of the great English writers of the Victorian period, including Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and Walt Whitman.

His first two novels, *The Primrose Path* and *The Chain of Destiny*, were first published in 1875. But while in Irving's employ, Stoker established himself as a novelist, publishing *The Snake's Pass, The Watter's Mou'*, and *The Shoulder of Shasta* in the years leading up to the publication of his seminal work *Dracula* in 1897.

Stoker married Florence Balcome in 1878, who gave birth to their only child, Irving Noel Thornley Stoker, in 1879. After suffering a series of strokes, rumored to be brought on by a case of syphilis, Stoker passed away in London on April 20, 1912, at the age of 64. His remains were cremated and placed into an urn currently on display in London.
