



William Shakespeare Playwright

William Shakespeare was born in Stratford-upon-Avon, England in 1564, the son of John Shakespeare, a glovemaker, and Mary Arden, the daughter of a prominent Catholic family in Stratford. At the age of 18, he married Anne Hathaway, and together they had three children, Susanna, Judith, and Hamnet.



In the late 1580s/early 1590s, Shakespeare arrived in London around the same time the English Navy defeated the Spanish Armada, establishing England as the strongest military power in Europe and London as the major hub of European culture and art. He joined the Lord Chamberlain's Men as an actor, shareholder, and writer and also gained fame and influence as a writer of poems, including 154 sonnets.

After the death of Queen Elizabeth in 1603 and the arrival of King James, the Lord Chamberlain's Men became the King's Men and served as the main playing company for the Royal Court.

In his career, he wrote several of the most beloved works in the history of the English language, including "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Romeo and Juliet," "Twelfth Night," "Much Ado About Nothing," "Hamlet," "Othello," "Macbeth," "The Tempest," and many more. In 1614, he sold his share in the King's Men and retired to Stratford for a brief time before his death in 1616.

Seven years later, in 1623, members of the King's Men undertook the effort of collecting all of Shakespeare's plays and publishing his First Folio. With the exception of the King James Bible, Shakespeare's First Folio is perhaps the most celebrated and most studied printed work in the history of the English language. Today we credit Shakespeare as the author of 38 plays that, over the course of 400 years, have been translated into hundreds of languages and performed throughout the world.





Characters in the Play

You know who Will Shakespeare is. And you probably know who Queen Elizabeth I is. But who are the rest of these guys? They are members of the Lord Chamberlain's Men, the troupe that will forever be known as the first company to stage Shakespeare's plays.

The Lord Chamberlain's Men

Cuthbert Burbage: General manager of the Lord Chamberlain's Men, inherited from his father James Burbage. There are no records of him actually stepping onstage in any official capacity, so we've imagined him as the beleaguered company stage manager.

Richard Burbage: Cuthbert's younger brother, and the leading actor for the company, probable originator of roles like Hamlet, Richard III, Macbeth, Henry V, and many others.

Alexander Cooke: The actor in charge of playing all of the leading ladies for the company, such as Juliet, Ophelia, Olivia, and others.

Will Kempe: The originator of the role of Sir John Falstaff, and regularly given all of Shakespeare's broad comic buffoons like Bottom and Dogberry.

Citizens of Windsor

Justice Shallow: An elderly justice, uncle to Slender, sues Falstaff for killing his deer

Slender: Shallow's nephew, suitor to Anne Page

Simple: Slender's servant

Master Page: A wealthy citizen of Windsor, father to Anne, wishes for Anne to marry Slender **Mistress Page**: Master Page's wife, mother to Anne, object of Falstaff's seductions, wishes for

Anne to marry Dr. Caius

Anne Page: The Pages' daughter of marrying age, in love with Fenton

Master Ford: A wealthy citizen of Windsor, disguises himself as Brooke to spy on his wife

Mistress Ford: Master Ford's wife, object of Falstaff's seductions

Sir John Falstaff: A knight of the realm, attempts to seduce Mistresses Page and Ford in an effort to blackmail their husbands and pay his debts

Pistol: A friend of Falstaff's **Nym**: A friend of Falstaff's

Mistress Quickly: Dr. Caius' housekeeper

Host of the Garter: Proprietor of the Garter Inn, Falstaff's favorite watering hole

Sir Hugh Evans: A Welsh parson

Dr. Caius: A French doctor and suitor to Anne Page

Fenton: Suitor to Anne Page



Director's Note

The notion that Shakespeare completed *The Merry Wives of Windsor* in only fourteen days for a special commission from Queen Elizabeth I dates back to 1702, when English critic and dramatist John Dennis recorded it in his introduction for his adaptation of the play. Given that the play was written around 1598 and this story about the circumstances of its writing first crops up nearly a century later, it's probably not true. It's a largely unsubstantiated anecdote that has passed into legend, like other pieces of Shakespearean theatrical tradition, such as: witty fool Robert Armin originating the role of *Othello's* despicable villain lago to get the audience on the character's side right from the off; Shakespeare helping King James I to translate passages of his eponymous translation of the Bible; or the Lord Chamberlain's Men carrying all the timber for the Globe across the Thames River in the dead of night to a new plot of land after getting evicted from their previous site. (Oh, wait, that last one actually did happen.)

So what? The story is probably fake. But it is captivating. It makes for a great little story to tell; a ragtag band of actors and their not-quite fearless writer, given a seemingly impossible task, and overcoming it. It's a story that brings one of the most revered writers in human history down off his pedestal and onto the everyday person's level: he's a guy on a deadline who's trying to keep the company he has helped to build afloat. If you've been around the theatre world in any capacity, you know that working in a time crunch with a laundry list of things to get done is all too common. In sharing this story, we can see ourselves as Shakespeare; the circumstance is so relatable.

And that's what theatre is, isn't it? Stories that we share because we relate to them and want to relate to others through them. Even when considering a fluffy comedy like Merry Wives, we find stories about people overcoming insurmountable odds. The way the characters do so is farcical in the extreme, but we still find bits of ourselves even in the most ridiculous moments. Especially in the most ridiculous moments.

(Side note: For my own part, I think the best evidence for the "written in two weeks" theory is the script itself. The uncut text of the play reads like it was written in two weeks; it is beyond sloppy. This thing has more pointless scenes that don't go anywhere than the last season of *Game of Thrones*.)

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
